News from the Library

MOTIVATING OUR KIDS TO READ AND BORROWING FROM THE LIBRARY


One well proven way to motivate our children to read, is to give them the opportunity for choice when selecting reading material.

I'm sure we as parents and carers, can remember being assigned reading material to read, and how it can have a negative impact on our enthusiasm for reading.

Sometimes reading is assigned but where possible it is important that we give children choice in this area.

All students are given the opportunity to borrow from our school library. Library borrowing is selected by the students. Sometimes they may come home with books beyond their reading abilities but, it is very important that we respect their choices and share their interest in the book. If you feel a book is something you might not want to share with your child, be it, too long, inappropriate content, maybe you could just have a discussion on why they selected it? or read a part of it with them.

We try and guide their borrowing a little, but try not to discourage them from their choice, because of our prior understanding of the power of selecting their own books can have on their motivation to learn to read.

WHY TEACH FAIRYTALES?

Fairy tales spark the imagination – Can you imagine how dry and sterile life would be if we didn't have fantasy stories to enjoy? Fairy tales help kids exercise their imagination which facilitates invention and discovery.

Cultural literacy – Although fairy tales are ancient stories, they are referred to frequently in many facets of modern life from "Cinderella" stories in sports to sayings about kissing lots of frogs before finding a prince. These references would make no sense to someone without exposure to fairy tales.

Story Structure – Fairy tales have a reliable story structure with clear good and evil characters, a well-defined setting, a problem, and a solution. When kids are read fairy tales they gain a basis for making predictions and comprehending other stories.

Love of Reading – As the Common Core recommends, kids do need plenty of exposure to nonfiction text because this is what they will spend a lot of time reading as adults. However, to really build a love of reading they should also have a chance to read or listen to enthralling fairy tales.


Smaller/Weaker Characters Win – In fairy tales, good always triumphs over evil. Frequently, the good character is small or weaker than the evil force in the story. Kids are always smaller and weaker than the adults around them so these fairy-tale characters become their heroes.
