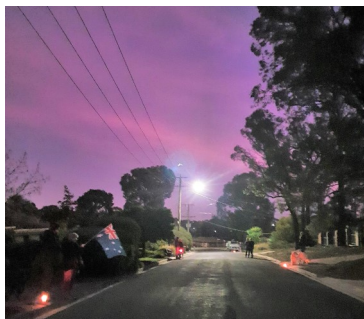

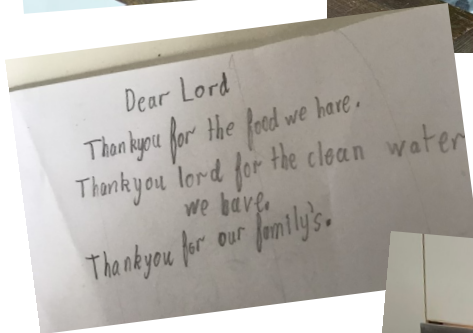

Something to Think About

The disciples in today's story don't recognise Jesus at first - even when he is walking beside them. We need to recognise Jesus in all people in our daily activities, in our family, friends, and even those people we don't know very well. Let's give a joyful welcome to those we meet each day!

The Scriptures

A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke 24:14-16, 28-31

As two of Jesus' disciples were talking and thinking about what had happened, Jesus came near and started walking along beside them. But they did not know who he was. When the two of them came near the village where they were going,

Jesus seemed to be going farther. They begged him, "Stay with us! It's already late, and the sun is going down." So Jesus went into the house to stay with them. After Jesus sat down to eat, he took some bread. He blessed it and broke it. Then he gave it to them. At once they knew who he was, but he disappeared.

This is a post-resurrection story from Luke's gospel. The disciples are disillusioned and disappointed because Jesus died on a cross, was buried in a tomb, and now his body is missing and they have been told 'he is risen from the dead'. Into this gloom walks Jesus, who walks with the two disciples along the road to Emmaus but the disciples do not recognise him.

Lord in heaven, hear my prayer, Keep me in your loving care. Be my guide in all I do. Bless all those who love me, too.

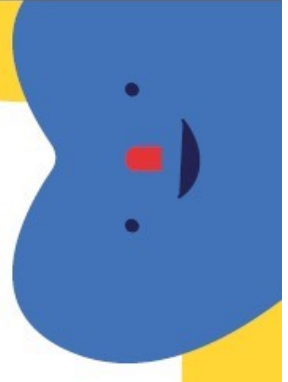
FRIDAY

HOW MANY ANIMALS SERVED IN WWI?

It is believed that over 16million served in the first world war. They were used for transport, communication and companionship. Horses, camels, donkeys, mules, dogs, pigeons, canaries, cats and dogs were all a crucial part of the war effort. Other animals such as monkeys, bears, lions and foxes were used as mascots and pets to raise morale and provide comfort during the hardships of war. (www.iwm.org.uk/history)

WHAT IS THE POPPY FOR?

The Flander's poppy is usually worn on Remembrance or Armistice Day in many countries to remind us of those who died in war or who still serve, but is often worn by Australians and New Zealanders on ANZAC (Australian and New Zealand Army Corps) Day. ANZAC Day is held every year on April 25th. In soldier's folklore, the vivid red of the poppy came from the blood of their comrades soaking the ground. (The Australian War Memorial-www.awm.gov.au)

ARE THERE DIFFERENT COLOURED POPPIES?

There are three different coloured poppies that can be worn now- the traditional red commemorates the soldiers lost or still serving in war; the white poppy symbolises peace and all casualties of war, and can be worn with or instead of the traditional red poppy; and then there is a purple poppy that remembers all the heroic animal deeds and sacrifices in war, which can be worn alongside the red or white poppy. Animals are often forgotten for their heroic service.
