
5th Sunday of Lent

Something to Think About

It is often said that it is easier to give than to receive. Are there times when I find it easier to forgive than to believe myself forgiven? Have you experienced being challenged for doing something wrong by someone who loves you or by someone who is hostile to you. What has been the difference? To forgive and be forgiven is a wonderful healing.

The Story

This story tells us about people who came to Jesus with different mindsets. The Pharisees and scribes were sure they were right and the woman knew that she had done wrong. The effecting of meeting Jesus and letting Him into their lives changes them powerfully. The Pharisees and scribes, through the words of Jesus were able to see that they too were sinners, like the woman they were accusing and they were not perfect. The woman, expecting to be punished for her error, received a lovely acceptance from Jesus which must have left a lasting impression on her.

The Scriptures John 8:1-11

Early in the morning he came again to the temple. All the people came to him and he sat down and began to teach them. The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman who had been caught in adultery; and making her stand before all of them, they said to him, 'Teacher, this woman was caught in the very act of committing adultery. Now in the law Moses commanded us to stone such women. Now what do you say?' They said this to test him, so that they might have some charge to bring against him. Jesus bent down and wrote with his finger on the ground. When they kept on questioning him, he straightened up and said to them, 'Let anyone among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her.' And once again he bent down and wrote on the ground. When they heard it, they went away, one by one, beginning with the elders; and Jesus was left alone with the woman standing before him. Jesus straightened up and said to her, 'Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?' She said, 'No one, sir.' And Jesus said, 'Neither do I condemn you. Go your way, and from now on do not sin again.'

Easter Masses at St. Kilians

Holy Week is the most solemn and glorious week in Christianity, the pinnacle of the liturgical year. It's more sacred than Christmas! This is because Holy Week commemorates the final week of Our Lord's life, the very purpose for which Christmas happened. Sundown on Holy Thursday to sundown on Easter Sunday is considered the most solemn part of the liturgical year. This three-day period is referred to as the Easter Triduum, also known as the Sacred Triduum, or Paschal Triduum. The word "triduum" comes from the Latin word triduum. which comes from tris ("three") + dies ("day"). Basically, the Sacred Triduum is one great festival recounting the last three days of Jesus' life on earth, the events of his Passion and Resurrection, when the Lamb of God laid down his life in atonement for our sins.

> Friday April 15 (Good Friday) - Stations of the Cross - 12:00pm


Veneration of the Cross - 3:00pm

"Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?" (John 11:25-26)

WHAT IS EASTER & WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

Easter is the oldest and most important date of the year on the Christian calendar, but it has no fixed date. Instead, it falls on the first Sunday after the full moon (Paschal Full moon) following the March equinox (varying from 22 March to 25 April). Easter is the celebration of the resurrection of Christ. Easter marks the end of Lent and the week leading up to Easter is known as Holy week. Holy week includes Holy Thursday (when Jesus had his last supper with the Apostles), Good Friday (the day that Christ was crucified) and Holy Saturday (commemorates the time between crucifixion and resurrection).

WHY DO WE EAT EGGS?

Christians consider eggs to symbolise joy and celebration, new life and resurrection. Eggs were forbidden to Christians during Lent, which was a time of fasting, so they would use up their eggs and dairy the night before Lent commenced on Shrove Tuesday (Pancake Tuesday). Christians would then eat eggs again at Easter time once Lent was over as they would have accumulated them during the Lenten period. Hence the association of eggs and Easter!

WHERE EASTER TRADITIONS BEGAN?

Decorating eggs came from the custom of staining eggs red in memory of the blood of Christ that was shed at his crucifixion. The Easter bunny also has origins in Germany among German Lutherans who depicted the Easter bunny or hare as a judge who decided whether or not children were well behaved enough to be rewarded with Easter eggs.

EASTER FACTS

People began gifting chocolate eggs to others in the 1900s. The first mass-produced egg was created by Cadbury in 1873. Australians will spend over \$2billion on chocolate, confectionery and decorations this year. Foil is 100% recyclable. Small pieces of foil individually recycled will be incorrectly sorted as paper and not recycled. By recycling foil/aluminium we save 95% of the resources needed to make new aluminium.

TIPS TO BE SUSTAINABLE AT EASTER

At Easter time we end up with lots of extra packaging and waste in our homes. Some tips to help you be sustainable during this time and help the environment include: • BUYING CHOCOLATE THAT IS PALM OIL FREE AND AUSTRALIAN MADE • RECYCLING CARDBOARD BOXES AND FOIL WRAPPERS MAKE A BALL OF FOIL THE SIZE OF A PING PONG BALL OR PLACE IT IN AN ALUMINIUM CAN TO RECYCLE IT PLASTIC CONTAINERS, INSERTS AND BAGS GO INTO LANDFILL REUSE PACKAGING TO CREATE OTHER AMAZING THINGS SWAP PLASTIC DECORATIONS AND GIFTS FOR HOMEMADE CRAFTS • COOK YOUR OWN TREATS INSTEAD OF BUYING THEM AND ENJOY SPENDING TIME TOGETHER AS A FAMILY. **RESOURCE:** https://www.interflora.com.au/blog/post/10-easter-facts
